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Pinckard woman on trial after allegedly shooting into vehicle

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OZARK — An incident involving a woman who authorities said jumped off a horse and started shooting at a passer-by two years ago may or may not have been more than just a random encounter, according to court testimony on Tuesday.

Cynthia McClendon, 40, of Dale County Road 554, is charged with shooting into a truck being driven by Adam Peterman.

Peterman said during testimony in the Dale County Courthouse on

Tuesday that he was checking fields he farmed, along where McClendon lives, in June 2008 when she randomly started shooting multiple times toward his vehicle, leaving a bullet hole in the windshield of the truck.

Peterman said he did not know McClendon before the incident and had no idea why she would want to shoot at him.

"I guess she's crazy. I don't know. ... All I could do was get away and call 911," he said.

McClendon's attorney, David Harrison, questioned if the day was

really the first time McClendon and Peterman encountered each other.

Harrison asked Peterman if he had ever shot or hunted in the area where McClendon lived and if there was any reason McClendon could have felt threatened.

Peterman said he did not hunt or travel with a gun and did not know that McClendon was threatened by him because he did not know her and didn't think she knew him.

McClendon's husband, Bryan, said the noise of Peterman's truck on the day of the incident could

have been like the sounds of other trucks driven by kids who used to rev their engines along the property.

"My wife had a rough two weeks and said she was gonna get up and ride the horse. Later I heard a loud noise and then heard an engine revving up. ... I didn't know where she was, if she had fallen off the horse, or what," Bryan McClendon said.

Cynthia McClendon's case is expected to continue Wednesday.

If convicted of the class B felony, she could face between two and 20 years in a state prison.

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
