

# Dale County man gets 20 years for abuse of stepson

Eddie Ledbetter pleaded guilty in November to abuse of Ebony Horton.

OZARK — A man whose family said he pleaded guilty despite being innocent to abusing his stepson was given a maximum prison sentence after more than three hours of testimony against him:

Dale County Circuit Judge Ken Quattlebaum sentenced Eddie Ledbetter, 24, to 20 years in prison on Tuesday for aggravated child abuse, which in which Ledbetter's 7-year-old stepson, Chad, suffered fractured ribs, cracked teeth, burned feet and infected insect bites while in custody of Ledbetter and the boy's mother, 28-year-old June Vicky Henry.

Ledbetter entered a blind plea to aggravated child abuse, a Class B felony, on

Medical personnel said statements from Henry showed Chad suffered severe punishment

from Ledbetter, including being forced to drink hot

Henry, who is also charged with aggravated child abuse, is set to stand trial in February.

"If I believed he did it, I would said 'lock him up,' but I don't. You stay in jail for a year and it wears you down. He asked for a lie detector test but couldn't get one. He was appointed an attorney for maybe \$2,500 for a case another lawyer said would cost me \$47,500," Ronnie said.

A possession of a con-
